Retelling of the section (5-7 sentence paragraph)	Retell the plot (story events) in the section. (If you have a large group, I suggest that you assign or rotate this assignment for the M, W, F discussions)	
Connection (to self/other text/world) (5-7 sentence paragraph)	Explain or describe the detail in the book that prompted your connection. Then, explain your connection.	
Feeling about author's craft (5-7 sentence paragraph)	There are two ways to approach this: through character and through passage analysis. Week ONE: Character analysis – Pick a character and describe them in detail. Focus more on personality and traits than physical description. Support your analysis with quotes (and page numbers) from the text. Week TWO: Passage analysis – Choose a section from the book that is particularly interesting. It could be a vivid description of a setting or a character interaction. It might be some really good dialogue, a new fact, or even metaphorical language! Record the passage and share your reflection about why it is important or interesting to you. Alternatively, you may choose to photocopy the page/passage and write your reflection on the back of the photocopy.	
Questions & Predictions (5-7 sentence paragraph)	What are you wondering about after reading a section? Are you confused about a character's action or decision? Do you have a prediction about what will happen next? Give me a sentence or two of context and then share your question and your prediction. You should be able to support the reasons behind your prediction as in, "I think this will happen because"	
Visualization	Illustrate it! Something in the book has given you a mental picture. Share it!	
Vocabulary card	When you come across a word that you do not understand or want to understand more clearly, look it up! Then create a Frayer model vocabulary card just like we did during vocabulary weeks.
